Rescuers had the unusual job of rescuing a Kingfisher inside a warehouse at Holme's Hill. The bird mistakenly flew inside and couldn't find its way out. Three rescuers attended on site and used long poles and nets to secure the bird as it flew around. It was not long before the bird was netted and in the hands of rescuers. The bird was checked over and found to be in a good condition and weight. Rescuers were able to release the bird at the on site pond where they have previously been seem.

Dozens of Ducks!

In late August, WRAS received multiple calls regarding a group of approximately 100 ducks crossing a busy road in Ridgewood near Uckfield. These mallard ducks, clearly captive breed, posed a safety hazard for both motorists and themselves. Concerned local residents sought assistance, prompting offduty rescuer Trevor Weeks

and duty rescuer Philly Cole to help guide the ducks to safety, leading them to a pond on the other side of the housing estate. However, the ducks continued to roam aimlessly around the estate, even attempting to return to the main road. To resolve the situation, Trevor and duty rescuer Jan McCord devised a plan to relocate the ducks to a sanctuary. Although tame, catching the ducks proved challenging, with 86 eventually being captured. Special thanks to the Retreat Animal Rescue Centre near Ashford for accommodating the ducks on short notice. WRAS is currently caring for two ducks that sustained injuries during their time wandering the estate.

Trapped Downland Gulls Rescued

In late August, WRAS rescuers received an unusual call regarding 13 unlucky gulls trapped in a water trough near Crowlink, located between Eastbourne and Seaford.

One gull was quickly freed and released on-site, while the remaining 12 were exhausted and soaked. They were taken to WRAS for rehabilitation.

It appeared that the gulls were diving in for water, likely due to a lack of natural water sources in the area, but they found it difficult to escape. As the trapped gulls struggled, more gulls were attracted to the scene. The narrow space and high tank edges made it impossible for them to fly out.

The rescuers returned the following day and installed a small ramp to help any future gulls that might find themselves in the same predicament.

After several weeks of treating feather damage and waterproofing, all of the gulls were successfully released back into the wild.

WRAS is accustomed to assisting birds and bats entangled in sticky situations like fly paper and glue traps. However, this August, a baby grass snake was brought in, stuck to a sticky label. The poor snake was dehydrated and underweight. The dedicated WRAS care team managed to free the snake gently, cleanse off the sticky residue, and placed the young snake in one of WRAS's tanks for recovery. The relieved snake was happy to be liberated and quickly resumed eating well. After a few weeks of care and rehabilitation, the snake was released back into the wild, healthy and fit.

Throughout the day, our ambulances are constantly engaged in rescues, releases, and tending to our off-site pens. Especially during the summer months, the mileage accumulates significantly. On 23rd August, when our rescuer went to refuel, they were surprised to find out that another customer had already paid for it intentionally while settling their own bill. Most distressed swan ever! By Trevor Weeks MBE

A young swan has been saved from drowning by two rowers and WRAS rescuers at the River Ouse in Lewes on Wednesday 13th August. My partner Kristy and I were in Ditchling attending to an injured blackbird, so as not too far away agreed to head down assess the situation.

The swan was found aimlessly floating in the river next to Tesco. Clearly in distress and unable to lift its head or move its wings and legs freely because of the entangled fishing line. Every time it tried to break free, it would lose balance and end up submerged. We were afraid it might drown before we could rescue it. Other rescuers were preparing boats and water rescue gear but were some distance away. While rowing along the river, a couple of men offered their

help. Since their boat was not very stable, caution was necessary. They skilfully guided the swan towards the bank with the boat's end, ensuring its safety. Despite a few tumbles, the swan managed to stay afloat. After a long and tense moment, the swan was finally close to the shore, allowing me to use a swan hook to secure it.

Once on the riverbank, we eases the pressure on the swan by cutting the line. Unfortunately, the swan had line tightly wrapped round one of its legs which was too difficult to remove out on site as well as a hook caught in it's cheek.

This was one of the worst entangled swans I have encountered in my 39 years of wildlife rescue work! I would like to express our gratitude to the two rowers for their help in saving the swan's life, as their swift action saved the swan from further distress and saved valuable time.

The swan was clearly very traumatised and after week at WRAS's Centre the swan was returned to the River Ouse by Tesco for release.

Nine deer in six weeks



September typically marks the beginning of our deer season, but this year it appears to have started early in mid August.

- 12th August: A baby fallow deer was found stuck in a stream at Blackboys; it was dried off and released once its mother was present.
- 24th August: An antler-entangled fallow buck was rescued at Hempstead Farm in Uckfield and released on-site.
- 25th August: A mobile fallow buck was spotted with large posts and line attached but could not be located after an extensive search.
- 26th August: Another antler-entangled fallow buck (see photo) was found on Down Street in Nutley and was released on-site.
- 28th August: A juvenile Roe deer was found with its leg entangled in stock fencing; unfortunately, it was severely injured and had to be euthanized.

This was followed by 5 more deer entanglements in September, including 2 in one day.

- 17th September: A fallow buck was found in a hedgerow with it's antlers caught in rope at Waldron and was released on-site.
- 17th September: Another antler-entangled Fallow buck at Piltdown. Rescued from a deep dry stream bed and successfully released.
- 20th September: Tricky fallow buck with antler entanglement in a wet and muddy stream in Ticehurst. Successfully released. (Cover Photo)
- 21st September: Road side antler entangled fallow buck. Police closed road to aid with release for guidance. Stay calm and be patient.


Network Rail requests WRAS's help.

WRAS received a call from one of Network Rail's Incident Response Managers after an injured gull was spotted between platforms 2 and 3 at Eastbourne Railway Station.

The poor bird which had an obviously fractured wing and was bleeding, clearly couldn't be left to suffer.

Rescuer Trevor Weeks attended and allow staff to use WRAS equipment and advised on how best to catch and handle the bird. Trains had to be spotted from for 5 minutes whilst the rescue took place.

Once on the platform Trevor examined the bird which had a extensive injuries and multiple fractures. the bird was taken to the nearby vets where its suffering was ended,
